

Letter from Mother Jacinta Miryam, SSCJ

Provincial Superior

Making sense of suffering

Dear Friends and Benefactors.

In my enclosed cover letter, I referred to the prayer of Our Lord that we find upon His lips in the Garden of Gethsemane. I also mentioned that so many of your personal intentions have made us want to cry out that the cup not have to be drunk by you.

The cup of suffering, ie., the crosses that befall each of us are a reality of life that has been a point of frustration that even finds many closing the door of their hearts to God. "If God is good, than why can this happen?" Questions like this have been asked throughout the history of the Church and even before the birth of Jesus.

I have found that St. Paul brings a wonderful insight and clarity to this question of suffering when he defines the Church as the Mystical Body of Christ. We know that suffering entered this world with original sin. It is an immediate result of sin but in all truth it can also be seen as a gift. For example, let us consider a broken ankle. Because of the pain that accompanies the break we recognize something is wrong. Upon recognizing a broken bone we can than seek healing. At this point, we often voluntarily take on pain of a lesser intensity when we agree to use crutches to get around. For those of you, who have

used crutches, you know that all to often the use of crutches can cause the hands and arm to ache; sometimes we even develop blisters because the hands are taking on the weight of the body to allow the ankle to heal.

I find that if I consider this example, I have some insights into suffering.

The human race is truly considered one mystical body. In our example, we saw that pain accompanied the breaking of the ankle. We may take this for granted, but I met a woman looking at a possible amputation of her foot because she did not have pain receptors in her body. She had broken her ankle early in the morning, but never recognized this and walked around all day without attending to it, causing additional complication and an infection. The experience of pain or suffering can than be seen as a gift and this is especially the case where sin is involved. The pain of sin alerts us to the harm that it is causing our soul and impacting on others.

We also saw in the example that the arm and hands made it possible for the ankle to heal by taking on the weight of the body and making movement possible. But remember this involves inconvenience since the hands are limited with how much they can carry and do while working the crutches, and, in addition, the hands and arms often have to endure aches, calluses and/or blisters. Likewise, often God asks us to go the extra mile, endure pain or suffering brought on by someone else's sin so that the healing grace of God can be effective in them. Some of you do it exceptionally well and so God seems to call upon you continually to take on crosses to bring healing to other members of Christ' mystical body. Know also that just as taking an aspirin to assist the aching foot will also lessen one's headache, so your prayers and acts of charity bring strength and consolation to the Church.



That aspirin or medicine that we referred to are made available to the Church in the form of thoughts words and deeds, or as the Church puts it during Lent, prayer, fasting and almsgiving. The foot may know nothing about the mouth taking medication or recognize the work of the hands, but it still benefits, so even should you be consigned to remain homebound or incapable of an active role in your community, your prayers, your kind words, your sacrifices are making it possible for souls, too broken to change on their own, to be forever indebted to you for your spiritual assistance.

However, in the light of Christ's Passion someone might ask, "Isn't the suffering Christ endured the means of our redemption? Aren't we making ourselves the savior when we attribute the healing of members of the Church to our sufferings and prayers?" Again I find the words of St. Paul coming to mind. He wrote "I make up in my body, what is lacking in the sufferings of Christ." Those words sound preposterous until we recognize that St. Paul is referring to the Mystical Body of Christ. Our Lord Jesus Christ's Passion has obtained all graces but He has joined Himself to us as our Head. In our analogy of the ankle, Jesus Christ serves as the blood with all the means to heal the bone, but He gives us the privilege of joining with Him in making this blood effective through our cooperation. By 'making up' for what is lacking in the sufferings of Christ, we are referring to the members of Christ's body, not the Head. And so our ability to serve (like the hands and arm in our analogy) as the crutch ,allows God's healing grace to restore and save the ankle, ie., the sinful member of His body as only Christ can do.

So be of good cheer, stand firm in hope, and let us all take up our cross, believing that God's ways are above our ways and that He can bring good out of every evil, material or moral, in whatever form it takes and let us support each other in prayer.

Reparation to the Most Sacred Heart of Jesus

(Based on the Writings of St. Joseph Sebastian Pelczar)

As a manifestation of love, the Holy Eucharist is the masterpiece of the Heart of Jesus, present always in this Most Holy Sacrament, ever living and open to all. Devotion therefore to the Most Sacred Heart of Jesus is a most efficacious means to intensify our honor and love for the Lord Jesus hidden in the Most Blessed Sacrament.

For love of us, the Lord Jesus not only lowered Himself, veiling His majesty beneath the Sacramental Species, but He opened Himself also to human contempt and ingratitude. In various places in the world, there are many sacrileges being committed through people's contempt and ingratitude, by way of theft from churches or unworthy reception of Holy Communion. A great number of Catholics omit Mass on Holy Days of Obligation. More and more people become victims of murder, violence, robbery and fraud. Narcotics, abortion and pornography are destroying family life and society. The Lord Jesus patiently endures all this in silence.

St. Joseph Sebastian Pelczar teaches: If you would worthily honor the Most Blessed Sacrament and the Most Sacred Heart of Jesus, strive to expiate the insults committed against God:

If unbelievers insult Him, you then, believe and publicly confess the faith; if they blaspheme Him, you worship the Lord loudly and encourage others to do so; if some offend the Lord by sacrilege, you then, receive Him into your pure



heart with proper preparation and thanksgiving, with great love and with the intention of making expiation for unworthy Communions; if you cannot receive the Lord sacramentally, then do so at least spiritually.


If the wicked desecrate churches, you then, conduct yourselves within them with respect and humility, your joy being to dwell in the houses of the Lord and to adorn them. If many are indifferent towards the Most Blessed Sacrament, you then, think of Him as often as you can, enthusiastically read, speak and listen to Him, and, above all, long for Him ardently, desiring to be as a sanctuary lamp burning before the altar. As often as you are able, strive daily to participate fully in

Holy Mass and to visit the Most Blessed Sacrament, or, if you are unable, at least turn to Jesus in your thoughts to send Him your ardent sighs or prayerful aspirations.

Try to participate in the First Friday Holy Mass of expiation. Make weekly or at least monthly adoration. Kneel before the Most Blessed Sacrament, greet and adore Him. To the furthest extent that you are able, promulgate the devotion to the Most Sacred Heart of Jesus.

The practice of the Holy Hour is recognized by the Church and deserves still greater attention since its purpose is for us to unite ourselves with the experiences of the Lord lesus in the Garden of Olives and to make expiation through the merits of the Lord's Passion. Each month, on the day before First Friday, from 11 p.m. until midnight, St. Margaret Mary practiced this Holy Hour on her knees before the Most Blessed Sacrament. Today the practice of the Holy Hour is observed in parishes and churches, and is usually joined with the evening Eucharistic Sacrifice as an expiatory adoration uniting us with the suffering Heart of Jesus.

In order to make expiation to the Most Sacred Heart of Jesus for the insults that He continually receives from people, there is the need for deep renewal in our life and concern for our purity of heart.
